The City of Morgan Hill's Long Range Planning Division conducted initial outreach and engagement to build awareness around the Healthy Neighborhoods for All Element. This section summarizes activities conducted to build awareness and a high-level overview of survey participation and key findings—up to this point in the process.

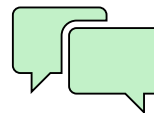
The survey encompassed two questions that presented environmental and social issues and several more questions that captured the demographics of respondents. The first question sought to identify and prioritize environmental and social issues being experienced by Morgan Hill community members based on topics that will be covered in the Healthy Neighborhoods for All Element. The second question focused on broadening understanding of environmental conditions impacting communities. Demographic questions helped identify gaps and opportunities to broaden engagement. Together, these efforts informed engagement materials and activities that supported and expanded the reach of this initiative.

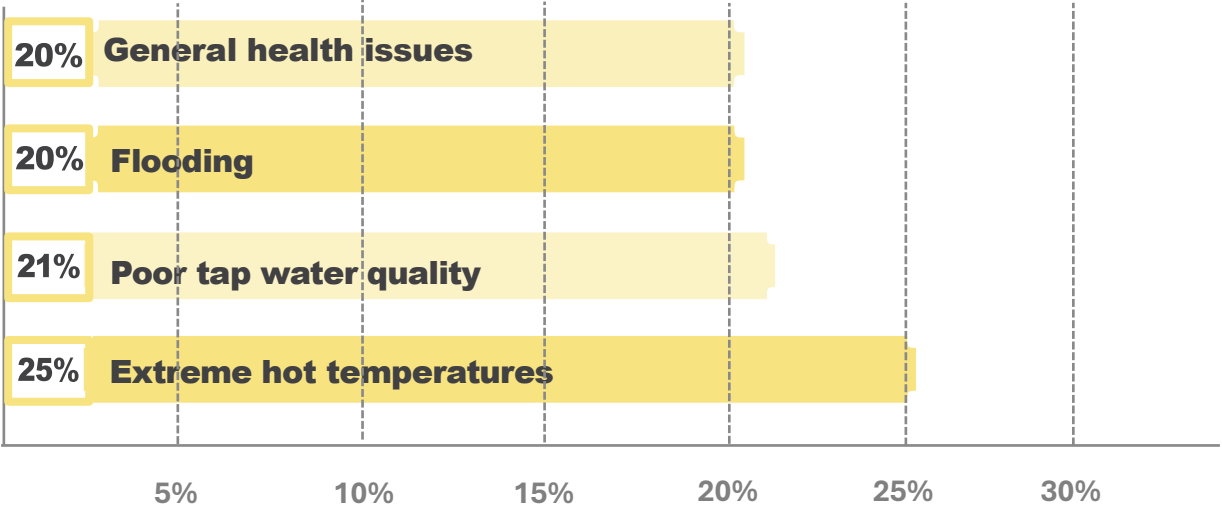

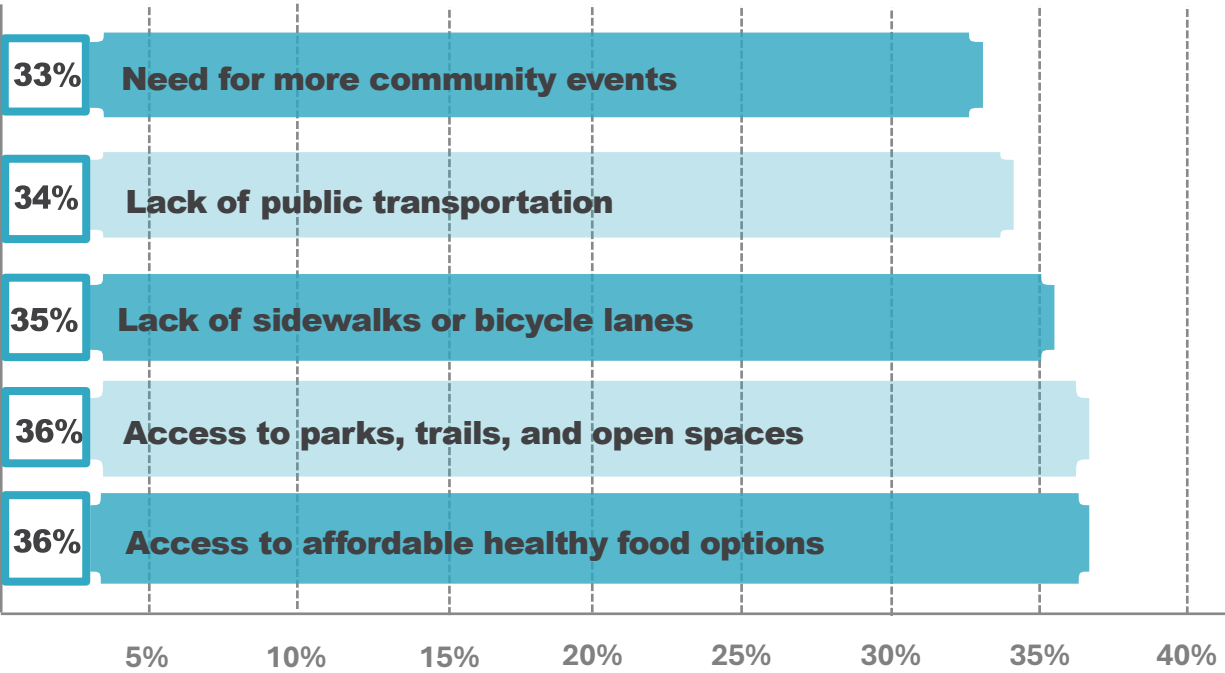

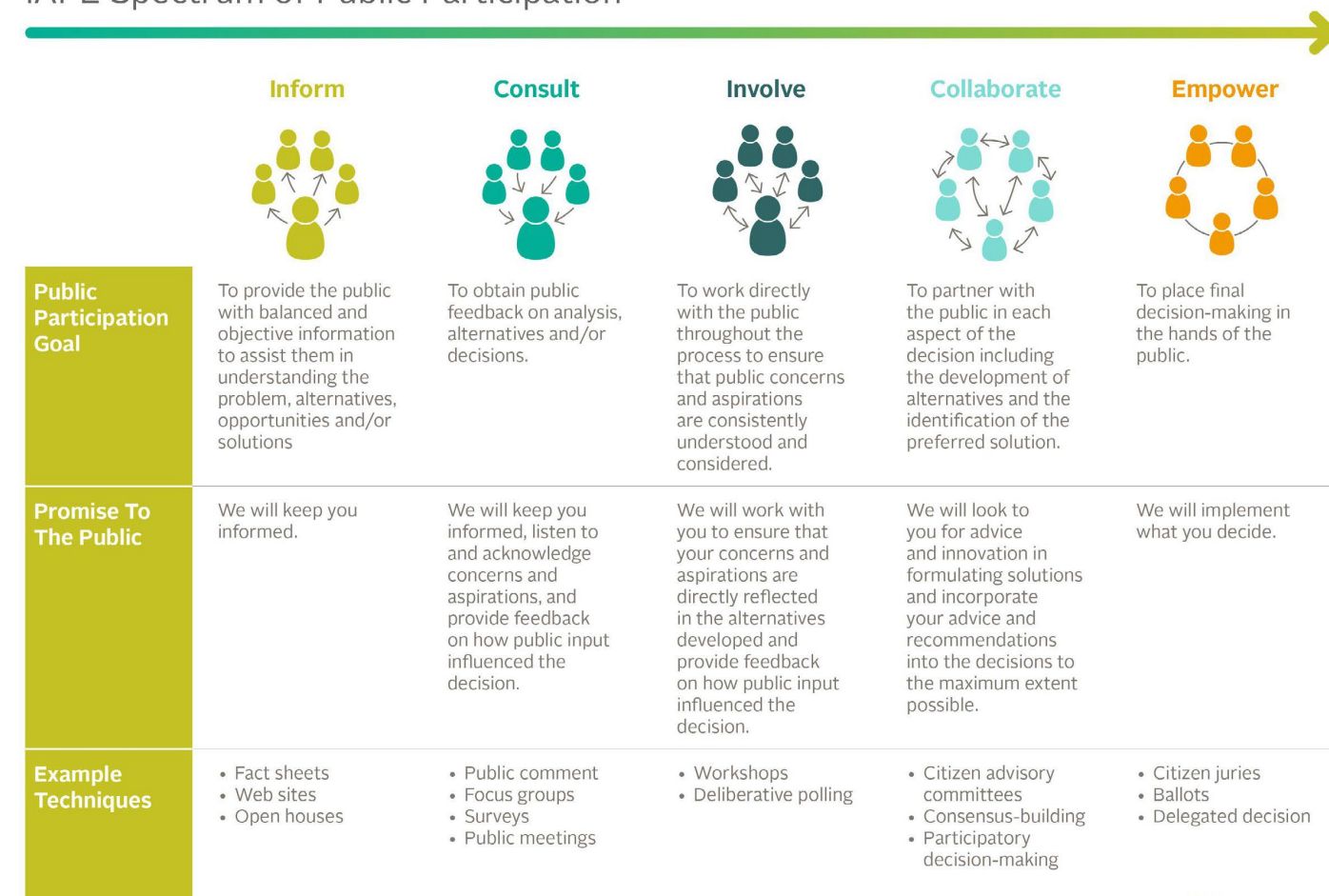
There are several audiences that were engaged throughout this process.



Spectrum of Public Participation

The project team facilitated the ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! steering committee, consisting of “Promotoras” (community ambassadors), CBO’s, Planning Commissioner members, and Santa Clara County Social Services Agency and South County Youth Task Force staff. Input from ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! will be incorporated into the Healthy Neighborhoods for All Element to support strategies that were equitable, culturally competent, and effective.

The City worked with community-based organizations (CBOs) and housing managers on outreach efforts and engagement activities to gather feedback, with the goal of reaching those who are most impacted.

A multifaceted approach was used to ensure various ways of community involvement and empowerment to facilitate the development of the Healthy Neighborhoods for All Element.

Pop-Up and Community Events

Community events were led by the Long Range Planning Division throughout the city to broadly engage community members on Healthy Neighborhoods for All topics in their neighborhoods, using different methods to meet people where they are.

Visioning Workshops

Visioning workshops to inform the development of the Healthy Neighborhoods for All Element were led by the Long Range Planning Division to meet community members of all age groups at places within their neighborhoods.

Roundtable Meetings

Facilitated by the Long Range Planning Division, roundtables provided the space for the ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! steering committee to share updates on ongoing outreach and engagement activities and lessons learned, as well as to provide input on the development of Healthy Neighborhoods for All goals, policies, and actions.



Engagement Tactics

The various engagement tactics that were deployed to gather a variety of input from community members are described below:

Flyers, posters, surveys, and newsletters in Spanish and English offered an opportunity to inform community members of the Healthy Neighborhood for All topics and create an opportunity to identify issues.


Pop-up events were organized at various businesses and schools to inform community members of the Healthy Neighborhood for All topics and to gather input.

Community events were organized at established community events and food distribution centers (with bilingual facilitators) to meet the community where they are and to gather input on Healthy Neighborhoods for All issues.


Workshops and meetings facilitated open discussions and knowledge-sharing (with bilingual facilitators) around relevant Healthy Neighborhoods for All topics, ensuring that community members had a platform to voice their ideas and concerns.

What We Heard

This section summarizes the community feedback received at the Pop-Up Events, Community Events, Visioning Workshops, and ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! steering committee. Each topic has a summary paragraph that gives an overview of what was commonly said by community members, followed by a section that outlines recurring themes and key issues regarding the topic.

Inclusive Public Engagement in City Decisions

Community members were interested in participating in civic engagement opportunities and expressed a desire to be made aware of topics of interest and the future decision-making processes. However, some community members were unsure of how to initiate their participation and voiced concern that they are not aware of the various opportunities available to them. Distance, time, and childcare hinder active civic engagement, highlighting the need for easily accessible opportunities to encourage involvement. Other barriers to participation, such as limited access to technology, transportation, and Spanish translation were also noted, emphasizing the importance of increased outreach efforts and providing a variety of ways to engage in City processes.

Suggestions for improving opportunities for civic participation included offering translation services at meetings, better marketing/notification of meetings, and providing childcare during meetings.

Desire for Community Involvement	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Community members expressed a positive attitude towards civic engagement, emphasizing their desire to be heard and be involved in decision-making processes regarding topics that affect or interest them.Challenges such as distance, time, and childcare were identified as impediments to civic engagement, highlighting the need for accessible opportunities for involvement.Community members said they did not know how to get involved or what issues are being heard at Planning Commission and City Council meetings.Hispanic/Latino community members expressed the fear they face of the recent Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) actions nationally, including raids and increased enforcement and deportation, thereby reducing community members interactions with the City.

Themes	Key Issues
Barriers to Civic Engagement	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Some community members felt uncertain about how to begin engaging and were not aware of available opportunities for involvement.Challenges around access to technology, transportation, and Spanish translation were noted as barriers to participation, indicating a need for increased accessibility and outreach efforts.
Communication and Outreach	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Improving communication between city officials and the community was suggested to facilitate civic engagement and ensure that community members are informed about opportunities to participate.Language and technology barriers hinder access to information, necessitating the translation of planning language into more accessible messaging and concerns about engaging the City’s Hispanic/Latino population.Community members expressed the need to increase visibility, access, and use of the City’s website in Spanish.During Visioning Workshops, community members were unaware of community events, expressing the need for better or alternative marketing for events.



What We Heard

Pollution Exposure and Air Quality

Community members advocated for increasing green spaces and tree canopy as strategies to improve environmental health, reduce pollution, and provide recreational opportunities. Addressing pollution exposure and air quality concerns, such as diesel traffic-related pollution and providing alternative transit options, was identified as essential to ensure the well-being and health of the community.

Many community members expressed the desire to bring back MoGo, or a similar rideshare program. Public transit within Morgan Hill is limited, and MoGo served as a last-mile on-demand rideshare service to supplement existing public transportation. It offered citywide trips to and from designated stops, with virtual stops located at key areas like commercial centers, community spaces, and neighborhoods, aiming for convenience and affordability. The service was a two-year pilot project that ended in early 2025.

Air and noise pollution due to heavy traffic were identified, especially in densely populated areas and near schools. Improvements to public and active transportation options, implementing regulations on vehicles to prevent traffic congestion and increasing the number of green spaces and trees were requested to enhance overall health and air quality.

Some community members advocated for integrating eco-friendly community amenities and practices to promote environmental sustainability and resilience, such as requiring zero emissions for businesses.



Themes	Key Issues
Traffic-related Pollution	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Concerns were raised about air and noise pollution resulting from heavy traffic, particularly in densely populated areas and near schools.A desire for improved public transportation and active transportation options to mitigate the negative effects of traffic on air quality was raised.Many community members expressed the desire to bring back MoGo or a similar rideshare program.More trees and green spaces are needed to improve air quality and overall environmental health.
Green Spaces and Access	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Many community members expressed the desire to increase the amount of green spaces and tree canopy within the City to offset pollution, provide areas to recreate, and provide shade.Increase community gardens, wider sidewalks, bike lanes, accessible transportation options for non-drivers, speed management for motorized vehicles, and bus shelters with weather protection were suggested.
Eco-friendly Community	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Some community members expressed concerns about homes abutting non-compatible uses such as industrial buildings and auto-repair shops.Concerns were raised about adjacent incompatible uses and the need to require zero emissions for businesses.Local air quality raised concerns for community members and the need to have an air filtration or air purifier program for homes.

What We Heard

Promoting Physical Activity

Community members highlighted that accessible healthcare services and well-maintained public spaces, including parks, are crucial to promoting physical and mental health in their communities. Community members that were engaged through this process emphasized the importance of infrastructure improvements for walking and cycling to encourage active lifestyles and provide opportunities for indoor and outdoor recreation. Community health centers were also prioritized to promote overall well-being and physical activity. Participants were interested in expanding affordable sports programs and recreation camps, especially for teenagers, and discussed the benefits of gardening and sports for physical health and community engagement.

What We Heard

Affordable Healthy Food Access

Three focus areas were suggested as priorities for improving access to healthy food: food affordability, expanding community garden programs, and promoting healthy food education.

Community members would like to improve the accessibility of healthy and affordable food options, especially for seniors with limited mobility. Community members have limited access to healthy and affordable options within walking/rolling distance, as the current food system is car-centric and the few large grocery stores are clustered together but are separated by significant distances from residences. Community members expressed that they use food distribution centers, but the days and hours of operation of the food distribution centers are limited due to only being open during work hours and therefore other community members who have jobs in need of accessible food are not able to use the food distribution centers. In addition, the locations of the food distribution centers are limited and therefore are car-centric for many community members.

To make healthy food options more accessible and affordable, it was recommended that local food systems be incentivized, provide additional community gardens near neighborhoods, and collaborate on food rescue programs. Workshops and programs that promote learning, personal growth, mental well-being, and focus on nutrition were also discussed.

What We Heard

Safe and Healthy Homes

The increasing cost of housing and the limited availability of affordable options were identified as the main barriers to safe and healthy homes. There was an overwhelming concern that individuals and families will be forced out of their homes due to the high costs of buying or renting property, making it difficult to find a suitable place to live in Morgan Hill. In addition, community members who rent expressed that they do not report health (i.e. mold, lead paint) and maintenance issues (i.e. plumbing or appliance issues) to landlords in fear that their rent will be raised. Overall, there was an underlying demand for more subsidized and affordable housing, including single-story and accessible housing options, to tackle the housing affordability crisis.

Community members also expressed concerns regarding community safety and overall health conditions within homes. Speeding of automobiles is a concern, in which community members felt unsafe walking or biking next to roadways. Ensuring safe and healthy homes was a priority with community members, with a focus on improving living conditions, particularly having clean drinkable tap water, air quality within homes, and receiving educational materials about healthy home living.

Community Well-being	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Ensuring safe and healthy homes was a priority, with a focus on improving living conditions.Issues of displacement, building maintenance, and the economic challenges faced by the community were also highlighted.Education programs were suggested to help community members learn about safe and sanitary homes to support community members in making healthy lifestyle choices.Access to clean water was a concern to many community members, with suggestions to have a water filtration program for homes be provided.Community members suggested better advocacy on water quality and water testing, especially to renters.Air quality within homes was a concern for areas adjacent to industrial and high-trafficked areas, with community members recommending air filtration or air purifier programs for homes be instilled.Eliminate the use of toxic pesticides.

What We Heard

Increase Overall Health

Opportunity Neighborhoods are more impacted by environmental and social factors influenced by climate change and the resilience of the built environment than more affluent communities, thereby impacting overall health of community members within the Opportunity Neighborhoods. Climate change is giving rise to extreme weather conditions that impact well-being, safety and overall health across the City, such as flooding, wildfires, and extreme heat; however, some neighborhoods bear a heavier burden and possess fewer resources to be able to cope with and respond to these challenges. To safeguard the city’s most vulnerable populations, such as low-income community members, children, seniors, and individuals with disabilities, it is essential to address climate vulnerabilities, especially within Opportunity Neighborhoods. Community members highlighted the need for increased resilience and health within their neighborhoods, ranging from health education to increased active transportation opportunities.

In addition, community members expressed a need for programs that address physical, mental and emotional well-being within their neighborhoods. This includes enhancement and support for social infrastructure such as health centers.

What We Heard

Public Facilities and Infrastructure

When community members were asked how to improve existing infrastructure and public spaces, many of the responses centered on increased support, access, and funding for programming opportunities. Community members voiced a desire for enhanced parks and affordable recreation that catered to the needs of all family members, particularly teenagers and adults, and provided safe opportunities for physical activity. The high costs for sports programs and summer recreation programs were a major concern for most community members. Apprehensions about recreating in the evening led community members to provide a broad range of ideas for how to increase safety within public spaces.

Stormwater infrastructure improvements were recommended as some community members had experienced some level of flooding within their neighborhoods. While specific suggestions for solutions to this were not made, it highlights the need for climate resilience and runoff capture both during times of extreme weather and normal storm events.

Lessons Learned

From August 2024 to August 2025, the City spearheaded dozens of community events and visioning workshops, as well as three ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! steering committee roundtable sessions.

The ¡Morgan Hill Prospera! steering committee sessions aimed to provide ongoing updates, offer a platform for steering committee members to voice community concerns directly to the City, and foster knowledge-sharing among participants. This approach facilitated the identification of recurring themes, real-time feedback collection and the enhancement of reports. In the roundtable sessions, steering committee members and city officials collaborated to align goals and expectations, devised engagement strategies, and addressed prevalent concerns within Opportunity Neighborhoods.

Reflecting on the outreach performed, the City recognizes the need to conduct various types of outreach. The Pop-up Events and Community Events served as ways to educate and inform the community of the Healthy Neighborhoods for All initiative, as well as build trust in the community. As community members saw City staff in the community more, community members began to open-up more and converse with staff regarding the work being performed and ultimately building relations to host visioning workshops at apartment complexes and affordable housing developments within the Opportunity Neighborhoods.

Food distribution centers, along with affordable apartment complexes, were invaluable locations to engage community members, and food provisions and prizes during engagement events were impactful. On the other hand, overcoming language barriers was identified early in the outreach process as essential and key to engagement endeavors led by the City.

Throughout the process, key takeaways included:

- A clearer understanding by community members of the Healthy Communities for All Element
- The development of cohesive engagement messages
- The identification of priority Healthy Communities for All topics
- Recommendations for improving community participation like incentive strategies, including raffles, gift cards, food, and translation services

Overall, the importance of community input in shaping policies and initiatives, highlighting the need for ongoing collaboration and support between the city, housing managers, and CBOs to address Healthy Neighborhoods for All issues effectively is underscored.
